EL SALVADOR: Dr Carlos Armando VARGAS LOPEZ

Dr Carlos Armando Vargas López, a surgeon aged 31, professor of the faculty of medicine in the department of physiology at the National University of El Salvador, was abducted on 16 December 1981 at 4.30 p.m. outside the 'Pasteur' clinic where he worked. He was abducted by men in plain clothes believed by eye witnesses to be members of the security forces, who had been waiting outside the clinic for an hour in a white Volkswagen and a Toyota van. At the same time two men in plain clothes were standing at the entrance to the clinic with rifles, undisturbed by ordinary police passing by. Dr. Vargas attempted to resist arrest and shouted for help. He was gagged, hit on the head with a rifle butt and thrown in the back of the Volkswagen van. It is believed that Dr. Vargas is being held by the Treasury Police (Polícia de Hacienda) although this is denied by the authorities.

Dr. Vargas began working as a lecturer in physiology at the university in 1979. Together with other doctors, he became active in 1980 in the Committee in Defence of Patients, Medical Workers and Health Institutions, an organization formed in response to attacks by security forces and paramilitary groups on patients and staff in clinics and hospitals throughout the country. When the military occupied and closed down the university in May 1980, Dr. Vargas returned to private practice, taking over his father's clinical laboratory in the centre of the city. It was from there that he was abducted.

Further recommended action:

Please continue to appeal on behalf of Dr. Carlos Armando Vargas López, seeking clarification of his whereabouts and requesting guarantees for his safety.
