Patricia Cuellar, a United States citizen, and her father, Mauricio Cuellar, "disappeared" on 28 July 1982. Patricia Cuellar, a secretary who formerly worked for the Socotto Jurídico, the legal aid office of the Archbishopric of San Salvador, was abducted by uniformed officers in San Salvador. Her father, a businessman and head of the Asociación Salvadoreña de Industriales (Salvadorian Association of Industrialists), was taken from his home in Salvador by men wearing olive green uniforms. The family's maid was also abducted.

The Salvadorian authorities have denied that these three people are being held by the security forces and there has been no news of their whereabouts.

## Further recommended action:

Please continue to send appeals on behalf of Patricia Cuellar, her father Mauricio Cuellar, and the maid who have been "disappeared" since 28 July 1982. Urge the authorities to acknowledge their detention, disclose their whereabouts and release them immediately unless formally charged and brought before a court. Urge that they be humanely treated while in detention.
